There are some news we would like to share with you at this point:

- We are actively working to publish a selection of papers discussed in the 3rd ELHN 2019 Conference in Amsterdam. Our request for a **Special Issue** to <u>AREAS-Revista</u> <u>Internacional de ciencias sociales</u>, was accepted. We are finalising papers for publication in the next few weeks.

Iva Peša, <u>Assistant Professor in Contemporary History</u> at Groningen University, specialized in the history of the African copperbelt, she is actually developing a new research project which explores the environmental history of oil drilling in the Niger Delta, the copper mining in Zambia, and the gold mining in South Africa (Johannesburg) from a comparative perspective.

Peter Alabán, <u>Doctor in History</u>, specialised in the social history of the industrial areas in the north-east of Hungary (20th and 21st century). Sonia Salsi, Independent Researcher. Coordinator of the project <u>Minatori di Memorie</u>. She is interested in the Italian migration in belgian coalfields, biographies and narratives, and oral history.
