European Labour History Network consolidates its role and future

During the conference at the International Institute of Social History in Amsterdam, there were some meeting in which the coordinators of the different working groups discussed different options about the



internal organization of the network, etc. One the main issue was the next venue. After a first proposal from Hungary and a discussion about its convenience considering the political situation, a second option (to be confirmed, is to organize next conference at Vienna, but with a strong collaboration from Hungarian academics, in order to express disgust and to express that we not leave them alone in front of the bad situation.

There will be a meeting of the coordinators of the working groups at Leiden, The Netherlands, in coincidence with the European Social Science History Conference (ESSHC) on 18 - 21 March 2020. There probably the next steps will be decided.
